From Our President's Desk

This month, I would like to share with you the very moving, motivating and uplifting words brought to us by Rabbi Gurkow on Rosh Hashana. They touched me, and I think they're worth a second look:

"...We gather here today in an attempt to express nothing but our most inner selves. We say to G-d; please look past our actions and past our outer appearances. See us for the gold and the preciousness that we are as we exist deep on the inside, where "we are your children" referring to you as our father. What mother/father bases their love towards their children upon their outer appearances or recent activities?

"We pray to G-d from the inside as well, from the inner depths of our hearts. The Talmud states "*Rahmana liba bai*" G-d prefers our hearts"

My children often ask me to play ball with them, and I oblige them with great joy. Sometimes they ask me to do their homework with them, and I oblige them with joy. Then there are times during which I am extremely pre-occupied with serious issues. During these moments I have no interest and zero tolerance in a ball, a game or even their homework needs. During these moments all their pleas fall upon deaf ears. But then when I look down at their little faces and I see the gems that they are to me, everything melts and I can't possibly refuse them a thing.

There are times or manifestations in which G-d takes interest in our various requests, pleas and prayers. During these times he may or may not respond positively depending upon our personal stature and level of intent. But through our hearts we can connect with G-d on a plane where he transcends reacting to our petty efforts. On this level he looks down towards us and grants us everything we are asking for, in abundance.

"My friends; this is the secret of the Shofar. Throughout the service we all approach G-d in our unique manners. No two people sitting here today are alike; our pleas come from all different directions. We seek to reach G-d on the distinct level – or in the exact chamber which houses our personal needs. In such attempts we are all so different from each other. Then the Shofar moment arrives! We approach G-d with a simple Shofar cry in which all – from the holiest Rabbi's to the simplest simpleton – produce the same exact pitch, sound, through which we touch G-d in the deepest way.

"How can we assure that G-d will indeed see us for whom we are on the inside? One way is by similarly assuring that we all look at each other for who we are on the inside rather then for what we

PHEW! WE MADE IT! We made it through the High Holidays - that is a true accomplishment. Mazal tov to all who participated in our Selichot evening, in which we viewed a pre-Selichot film, and then held a halachically-correct 12:45 AM (!) Selichot minvan, led by Rabbi Gurkow, Mazal toy to those who expanded the women's section downstairs, to those who dressed the shul in white, and to those who kept the Torahs ready for reading. Let's not forget everyone who worked so hard to make sure our small children were in shul, happy and entertained. Think about the shul committees that planned and prepared for us. Remember those who walked such distances to be with us for all the Yom Kippur services, that they had to sleep in the shul. Those who built their succot - some of them in torrential downpours! - and then helped to build, decorate and take down the shul's succah as well. Those who managed various parties and events, and who set up Kiddush and Third Meals. Let's think about those who truly prayed for the people of Israel and for our congregation, and those who forgave offenses without a second thought. Remember the beautiful, at times heart-wrenching davening led by Rabbi Gurkow and Cantor Aptowitzer, and the blessings we received from our Kohanim. Remember those who cooked meal after meal (after meal) for Rosh Hashana and Succot, keeping the ants out of the honey jar without killing them, buying an average of 75 challot, and fitting physically impossible numbers of hungry guests into their succot. Let's certainly not forget the Saturday night clean up at shul and home after the holidays ended, as well as all the work waiting on our desks after so many days off. And those who used all their vacation time (and then some) worrying about tak-

ing so many days off from work in order to be in shul and keeping the holidays. Mazal tov to our congregation and Ritual Committee who answered our call to thoughtfully explore Halacha for modest and appropriate ways to increase our mothers' and daughters' participation. And let's remember those who patiently taught others how to recite the blessings, shake the lulav, and do hoshanot. Think about our clean and pressed clothing, and that the kids were all dressed so smartly. Somehow, we pulled it all together. Mazal tov to those who felt fear of Heaven and cleaved to Hashem at the sound of the Shofar, to those who were hungry and tired, and who cried for their sins on Yom Kippur, to those who had fun and felt happy on Succot, to those who ate or slept exclusively in the succah, and to those who truly rejoiced in the Torah on Simchat Torah with their entire heart, soul and body. To all who arrived on time to services, who successfully built minyanim, and who lit candles on time - Yasher Koach! (May you have strength!) None of this is easy!

When we see each other day after day, and together we pray those special parts in the Siddur, reserved for these holy days; when we fast together, when we eat together, and when we perform these very Jewish rituals together; when the calendar draws our focus away from the outside world and into Torah, and we experience the resulting true simcha (joy), not only do our mitzvot alter the universe in a profound and eternal way, but we gain an incomparable sense of community - a sense of family - stronger than any other time of the year. It helps us to remember who we really are - each one of us is a mission-critical, irreplaceable member of the beautiful and precious Jewish family in this neighborhood, eternally linked to G-d, to Torah, and to each other.

Volunteers, of necessity, purchase items for the shul. Such items could be food for the kiddush or 3rd meal, books, stationery, postage stamps, serving utensils, etc. To be reimbursed for these purchases, receipts must be submitted to the Treasurer, stapled to a shul expense form. These forms can be obtained from the Clerk (V. Kalman) or the Treasurer (J. Wagner). Remember, the Treasurer is not authorized to reimburse volunteers unless the required paperwork has been submitted to him.

appear on the outside. You know? Our people have been broken up and divided into denominations. The Adams Street community stands unique in that we constitute an ingathering of representatives from all these denominations, and yet all of the variations that serve to distinguish us from each other are only external and on the outside whereas deep on the inside we are all really one and the same. We are all equally human, equally Jewish and equally consistent of a G-dly soul which burns with passion and love.

"We must find a way to look past the external qualities or lack thereof which fragment us and yearn to honor the precious interior that unites us. From this perspective we are all one and the same. Noone in this community is expendable; every member is precious and irreplaceable. Those on the right must stop looking leftward when viewing those on the left and those on the left must stop looking rightward when viewing those on the right. We must all look *Up* towards each other as absolute equal components of the beautiful puzzle which is this congregation. Take one piece out or lose it and your entire puzzle becomes incomplete.

My friends; this is not an easy request that I make of you. Sure, there are enormous contributions that each component adds to the puzzle. There are those who maintain the ritual activities, there are others keep alive the administrational activities, neither of which is more integral or less integral then the other. But we must focus our visions of each other beyond the varying contributions and instead recognize our overall commitment to the single cause.

We must make a *Total Commitment* towards ensuring harmony, and sometimes it means sacrificing matters of extreme importance for the benefit of the whole. Sometimes it may require you to give up a large chunk of yourself for the benefit of the *Us*.

We see the particular strengths in each other when we spend some time to understand each other. We all have interests that sometime conflict with each other, but when we understand where each one's respective needs come from, it is easier to respect them and live together.

Today happens to be the birthday of Adam & Eve. I want you to contemplate a fascinating concept. Eve was convinced by the serpent to eat from the tree and she fed it to Adam. They were then punished and banished from Eden. In modern day mode Adam would have immediately pointed a finger towards Eve blaming her for the entire escapade. "You altered the lives for all of history," he should have thundered? But instead what does the Torah tell us? Immediately upon having been driven out of Eden; *«ve-haadam yada et hava»* Adam understood Eve. Our sages interpret this to mean that Adam mated and bonded with Eve, but perhaps we shouldn t lose sight of its most literal meaning; Adam sat down and tried to understand his wife, they made a mistake, and they were paying for it dearly.

It's so important for all of us to respect each other's needs and interests rather then easily disqualify them. It's important for us to recognize each other's strengths rather then their weaknesses. It's important for us to see and perceive each other for what we are on the interior, a true family of brothers & sisters belonging to one father in heaven.

And when G-d sees our commitment to relating towards each other with such appreciation, he will undoubtedly be moved to view us from that same perspective. And he will instantly bless us with a Kesiva V'chasima Tova, a year of reigning success, growth, harmony and happiness."
